

Student Support Team

We look forward to even bigger and better things

When new students are referred to ACES, our Student Support Team will first of all meet with the whanau to share our school's values and also provide an overview of our curriculum. The first meeting will either occur at the enrolling school, in the home or at our Campus. These meetings often evoke a gamut of emotions for the whanau creating a legitimate nervousness and apprehension about alternative education.

However, the strength of our Student Support Team is the ability to organically make a connection and build a rapport with the whanau face-to-face (kanohi ki te kanohi). It is usually during these times of whakawhanaungatanga (connection) that we see the personality and potential (hidden strengths) of the young person emerge that sometimes can be lost in the paperwork of the referral.

Earlier this year, my colleague Greg Davis (Student Support) visited a home. The young person was not home, so Greg introduced himself to the grandmother who was visibly distressed due to the feeling of a lack of support from agencies for her grandson who spent more time living at the homes of his mates than he did in his own where.

For the next 2x hours, Greg simply sat and listened to the broken voice and aching heart of this grandmother. The reality is that this approach of just being there for the whanau attentively listening to their story is so natural for Greg ... and for the rest of our team. You can not help but walk away from any meeting with a new whanau vicariously carrying a portion of their burden and anxiety.

A few weeks later, Greg was invited to the Family Group Conference of this young man. Professionals who had been assigned to the young person a few months previously were all seated around the table in the hui. When all the introductions from the different agencies were completed, the same grandmother whom Greg had met in her home a few weeks earlier had her chance to speak ... and she said ... "I know Greg ... but all







you other people ... I have never met before!". People don't care how much you know until they know how much you care.

'HEART' is one of our core values ... and bringing hope and, if possible, healing to the heart of a new whanau is the energy force (mission) behind our mahi!




